





I recently received an email informing me of the winter fuel allowance payment I will be receiving shortly! I thought may be the government had made a U-turn on its recent budget policy, or I had missed some recent news on the WFA to pensioners. I took a closer look at the email and found it had been sent from Japan. No! it was just another scam.

I was impressed on the professionalism of the content of the missive, it was obviously put together using an AI system.

The speed of development in AI is also impressive as scammers have become very skilled at Deepfake presentations using your data profiles stolen from BT, Amazon, Google, Microsoft, Apple and many others (including Banks and financial institutions) but scam emails are common place these days and users are becoming complacent when receiving them and many are left on email servers.

Billions of scam emails are sent out every day and like telephone calls form loft insulation companies they are a nuisance, but they shouldn't be ignored or accepted as part of one of life's carbuncles. They should be deleted and cleared from your history files and caches, emails containing smart cookies can self-spawn and continue to monitor your activity without you knowing it.

The problem with AI is that it is not yet smart enough to discriminate between a truth and a lie, the person who could write such a program would become very rich indeed. So, for the time being AI remains a plaything and a scammers best friend. It can replicate a voice and facial features; it can be written to trick you into handing over cash and remember very personal facts about you and your family can be stolen for future scams, and believe me there will be plenty.

If you are asked to supply money to a loved one, ask them to relate a safe word, phrase or saying which you've previously arranged with them, the wrong answer will indicate a scammer.

As Christmas looms ever closer, your guard may be down and you could be easily duped in believing all kinds of stories or excuses, the scammers are well versed in hard luck, sob stories and get rich quick schemes so don't be fooled, you may truly regret giving, forgiving or being charitable.



<u>Week St Mary Bonaventures</u> <u>Women's Institute - November Meeting</u>

At our open meeting in November our talk was given by Frances Stuart who is an Ambassador for Lundy. nb do NOT call it Lundy Island! Lund is ancient Norse for Puffin and ey means Island (vou will see that the name of many of the UK's islands ends in "ey") and it was given this name by marauding Vikings in the 9th century. It is 3 miles long and $\frac{1}{2}$ mile wide and is 400 feet above sea level. It is made of granite and is a volcanic plug although there is one thin strip of rock at the southern end of the island which is called Lundvite and is unique. The difference in height between high and low tides there in the Bristol Channel is one of the greatest in the world. Historically the island was visited by Welsh saints and hermits and was a strategic base for pirates. In fact, in 1244 Henry III built a castle there after the downfall of the piratical Mariscos who had leased the island. The remains can still be visited. It was also a Royalist stronghold during the Civil War.

Travel to the island for residents, staying guests and visitors is by ship, MS Oldenburg, from either Bideford or Ilfracombe which takes under 2 hours. In the winter there is a helicopter service from Hartland Point for residents and staying guests which only takes 6 minutes. The ship is not only used for passengers it also transports food, drink, animals and their foodstuffs – in fact all the supplies that are needed – and returns with recycling and rubbish. Good news is that a jetty was built in 1998-99 – a much easier way to arrive and depart than previously!

The island was purchased in 1967 from the Harman family by the National Trust (who received the gift of the purchase price from Jack Hayward) and is leased to the Landmark Trust which owns all 23 buildings. There are 28 permanent

Mr Fay was asked for clarification on the posts. Cllr Slade reiterated that the goals must not be socketed, as the sockets cannot be left in the ground. The goals will be placed on the December agenda so that the parish council and football club are clear with what is happening.

4. Parsonage Green

Cllr Slade said that parking is a problem in the area, and recently it has been very busy. It has been an ongoing problem for years and is from the pub car park upwards, with vehicles solidly parked. She said there is a risk of the fire brigade or ambulance not being able to get through. The clerk and Cllr Chopak will go back to Oliver Jones at Highways to say that the current situation is not working and what can be done.

5. Christmas Tree Festival

The parish council is set to have a tree in the village Christmas tree festival at the parish hall. It was proposed that councillors would contribute to pay for any decorations needed.

6. Budget

Councillors agreed on a budget of £26,964.44, with the precept being set at £25,000. The parish council will reinstate the graveyard grants and community shop funding into the precept. Cllr Slade said she would be happy to look at grants to extend the path over the next few years.

residents who are all employed by the Landmark Trust/ Company. The Landmark Company is the commercial arm and feeds all its profits into the Trust. They also provide first responders, coastguards, first aid and fire service. The island boasts the oldest privately owned Post Office in the world and the stamps bear its own currency which is 1 puffin = 1 penny. The only hostelry is the Marisco Tavern which is open 24hrs for shelter. The first lighthouse was built in 1821 on the highest point in the island. Unfortunately, it was subject to fog (who'd have thought it?) so 2 new lighthouses had to be built in 1896: one at NW point and the other at SE point.

The wildlife is the main attraction for visitors. The island has been designated a Site of Scientific Interest but is still a working farm with a small herd of Highland cattle – which can cope with the weather! It has its own breed of ponies who are feral as well as Sika deer and Sohay sheep. In order to protect wildlife and nature it is important that correct numbers are held in order to maintain balance. Pygmy shrews are the only truly native species. Atlantic seals breed there in the autumn and did you know that seals can sleep whilst they are in the water? Lundy cabbage is unique and is food for a unique herd of goats.

The most famous residents are the puffins after which the island was named. Unfortunately, in 2001, the population was reduced to 5 because of an infestation of rats. These have been removed and the puffin population in 2023 was 1,800. The record for the number of sand eels held in a beak (as you see in many photographs) is 126! Puffins spend 7 months at sea during which they separate from their mate. However, they mate for life and always nest in the same spot from May to July. Like Manx sheer-waters, they burrow in the ground and have one egg per year.

Cllr Chopak said she had a meeting with SWW on October 10 at which they promise actions. She has also spoken with Ben Maguire, North Cornwall MP about it, and he will also follow up. A representative is to be invited to a parish council meeting.

3. Playing field

Cllr Slade said the parish council has taken over the cutting of the top of the playing field in line with the dividing fence, and the changing rooms. Also, the slip-way on the righthand side and the bottom new area. The football club will continue to cut the bottom field, where their sheds are and where they park their cars. She urged that there be no grass tipping down there or in the ditches.

Cllr Slade said there had been damage done to part of the fence that goes between the two fields. Cllr Hamlyn repaired the damage at short notice, but this had to be carried out quickly.

Paddy Fay, chairman of the football club said there had been a break-in to the changing rooms, sometime from Saturday until late on Wednesday evening. There was possibly a window left open.

Cllr Slade urged councillors and members of the public to keep their eyes open for any damage sustained in the parish. The more money the parish council has got to spend on repairs, the less money that will be available to the parish. Cllr Hamlyn commented on the initial reports from the play-

ing field inspection. This picked up a couple of points with the ramp. The cost of materials to make this good would be £339.60 inc VAT plus a 10% discount.

Councillors agreed for Cllr Hamlyn to carry on with this work.

The clerk will forward on the email to the football club, as it contains a piece about a rotten fence post.

8c. Planning - to note

PA24/07181 – Outline Planning Permission with all matters reserved for proposed residential development (up to five dwellings). Land east of The Coach House, Week Green, Week St Mary.

Councillors raised objection to the plans on the grounds of – narrow entrance; safety concerns around the entrance; not consistent with the intention around an AGLV designation; market housing and not starter homes; environmental impact (habitats); overdevelopment.

Week St. Mary Parish Council held on Thursday, November 7th 2024

- 1. **Public question time** (15 minutes allowed for this on matters on the agenda only)
- 2. One member of the public (MOP) spoke about the application PA24/07181. She said 12 objectors have submitted their disapproval at the plans. She questioned why the applicant wants to use their drive for access. Another MOP said there was already a problem in the area with water. He questioned how vehicles, especially bin collections and delivery drivers can access the area. He feared a large number of cars would be generated from the houses, if built. He said it is a blind turning, and raised concerns about what will happen to the rest of the field if planning permission is granted. He said there is also evidence of Sparrow Hawks, Buzzards and Gold Crests.

A MOP asked about the funding application from the football club towards to goalposts. He said the club is keen to get the new goal posts put in on the top pitch. He also addressed the council about the need to extend the lease on the pitch – this is needed if they are to apply for FA and Football Foundation grants.

2 To receive County Councillor Nicky Chopak's report on matters arising

Cllr Chopak said there had been a vote of no confidence in the leader of Cornwall Council. Although this failed, it is hoped that it will be a wake-up call. Cllr Chopak said she sits on the Health and Adult Social Care Committee, and there have been lengthy discussions about putting fluoride in water. Cornwall Council will be writing to the Secretary of State, and there will be a public consultation to ask people if they would like fluoride in their water. Cllr Chopak has recently given £500 from her Community Chest to pay for toothbrushes, which some children do not have. Cllr Chopak said the new waste and recycling scheme has begun and there have been some issues. There will be a meeting on November 18 to discuss how Stratton Minor Injuries Unit will operate in the future.
