





### Week St Mary Bonaventures WI

After the excesses of Christmas and the fact that it is "No Meat January", Members welcomed AI from Trigon Farm who praised the values of vegetables. AI, his wife and son originally lived in London but moved to Northampton as they felt the need to connect more with the land and rented an allotment. Both parents and grandparents were farmers and, because they also wanted to keep animals, they moved to Trigon Farm near Holsworthy in 2020.

It was important to them to start from scratch and design a new farm using permaculture principles, no-dig and regenerative agriculture practices. They are passionate about growing chemical free food. They use the no-dig method to grow vegetables and flowers, where they do not disturb the soil but let the micro-organisms, fungi and worms do their work and, in turn, the whole soil structure improves over time. The aim is to create a stable, bio-diverse ecosystem. Although there are also chickens which eat the caterpillars and ducks which help with the slugs!

We were encouraged to move to appreciating the taste of fresh food and to enjoy eating seasonally. The farm is now virtually self-sufficient in vegetables and fruit including winter time. This is helped by the use of polytunnels, because of the uncertain weather, and the addition of food that has been preserved or frozen. Although Al's wife is a vegetarian, Al eats meat but only when he knows the source as he is concerned about animal welfare. As we know this means that the meat is generally more expensive – another reason for increasing the amount of vegetables in one's diet.

The farm offers no-dig and permaculture courses, flower workshops, educational days out for schools, Farm to Table dinners, sustainable weddings, private events, sustainability talks for company Green Day events and seasonal flowers and vegetables. They offer sustainable flowers for any occasion with the flower arrangements using only natural, compostable ingredients and innovation in flower displays. Individual events include Natural skincare workshops, Permaculture in your garden, Floral workshops (flower arrangements, wreaths and dried flowers), pizza masterclasses, Guided farm tours, Herbs and edible flowers in your kitchen, Tomato feast, Food preservation courses and Pizza evenings. Apart from this, depending on the season, the farm also sells skincare salves,

vegetable boxes, PYO flowers, posies, bouquets and wreaths. We were all delighted to discover that all this was on our doorstep and have plans to visit the farm. Al told us that the best time to visit was from summer to October. Details can be found at trigonfarm.co.uk





Football Club Mid-Season Update Part 2 – Jan/Feb 2025

The senior team continue to improve at pace with the squad containing a huge amount of talent that belies their young age. The squad has 36 players registered to play but typically

operates with a regular group of around 20. The season has started well winning 7 out of our opening 12 league games to leave us currently sitting in 4<sup>th</sup> place in the league. We are also still in the Hutching's Cup, facing Bradworthy in the quarter final. The drainage issues on the lower pitch continue to frustrate and we've had to resort to hiring the artificial pitch at Launceston College to play some 'home' games away from the village at a significant cost to the club and with lost revenues from the tea shed and for the Old Orchard Inn.



We continue to investigate extending our lease to be able access potential grant opportunities with a view to resolving the issues as soon as possible. This season the team received a new kit, kindly sponsored by Bonny Shanks and Jon Steele at Horst Construction. Ruminations from the Rectory The Pencil's Tale

### Good News

At the January Parish Council meeting, Councillors voted to reinstate the goals on the top pitch to restore 11-a-side football back to its original home of the last 25 years and further back again to the '70's.

The club worked hard with the PC to mitigate any health and

afety concerns associated with the play equipment. This included consultation with the Cornwall FA, which resulted in the pitch meeting the required 1.8m run off distance on all sides. Further consultation with the Play Inspection Company highlighted that there was no recommended segregation distance, and that with appropriate signage and continuous monitoring, play could resume as before. Public question time (15 minutes allowed for this – on matters on the agenda only) None.

To receive County Councillor Nicky Chopak's report on matters arising

Cllr Chopak reported that residents can now look at the budget proposals on Cornwall Council's website. She said there has been a suggestion of 100 redundancies at Cornwall Council. One area at risk is the handyman service, which is up for consultation. She said this is a vital service for the vulnerable and elderly in the area. She noted that there was an amber health warning in place, with A&E departments full. She urged people to check on their neighbours etc.

### Speeding

Cllr Slade extended thanks to Cllrs Richardson and Hamlyn for producing a map for Highways. Cllr Richardson said there will be a radar (covert monitoring) for the road approaching from the north of the park. It is also hoped there will be three speed activated signs, and three posts will be installed, probably mid-May.

Football club lease

Cllr Slade noted that a working group had met to go over the lease. The council needs to know the names of the trustees and also a plan of the drainage of the bottom field. This will be placed back on the February agenda.

Football goals

Councillors discussed the matter along with Paddy Fay, chairman of Week St Mary Football Club. It was noted that the goal was removed following the annual play inspection in 2022. Mr Fay explained the large goals are needed for the Under 15s. He was asked why they cannot go on the bottom pitch, but said this was to protect the pitch, as he felt the drainage was better on the top part of the playing field. Cllr Hamlyn said the top pitch gets just as wet. There was concern that if the seniors played on the top field, where would the youngsters play. Cllr Chopak said the two parties need to reach a mutual understanding and raking up old minutes was not helpful. She suggested a possible trial arrangement with an understanding of the parish council's concerns. If an issue arises, the goals would have to come back out again. If an incident happened, pitch arrangement would be reviewed, she added. Mr Fay said the football club had no intention of bringing the senior squads on the top pitch but he was against a rule saving no senior football there. It was proposed to put the new goals back on the upper playing field. Due to the gueries raised following a previous play inspection report, it was decided to draw up something in
