



Complacency and AI are bad bedfellows

I recently received an email informing me of the winter fuel allowance payment I will be receiving shortly! I thought may be the government had made a U-turn on its recent budget policy, or I had missed some recent news on the WFA to pensioners. I took a closer look at the email and found it had been sent from Japan. No! it was just another scam.

I was impressed on the professionalism of the content of the missive, it was obviously put together using an AI system.

The speed of development in AI is also impressive as scammers have become very skilled at Deepfake presentations using your data profiles stolen from BT, Amazon, Google, Microsoft, Apple and many others (including Banks and financial institutions) but scam emails are common place these days and users are becoming complacent when receiving them and many are left on email servers.

Billions of scam emails are sent out every day and like telephone calls form loft insulation companies they are a nuisance, but they shouldn't be ignored or accepted as part of one of life's carbuncles. They should be deleted and cleared from your history files and caches, emails containing smart cookies can self-spawn and continue to monitor your activity without you knowing it.

The problem with AI is that it is not yet smart enough to discriminate between a truth and a lie, the person who could write such a program would become very rich indeed. So, for the time being AI remains a plaything and a scammers best friend. It can replicate a voice and facial features; it can be written to trick you into handing over cash and remember very personal facts about you and your family can be stolen for future scams, and believe me there will be plenty.

If you are asked to supply money to a loved one, ask them to relate a safe word, phrase or saying which you've previously arranged with them, the wrong answer will indicate a scammer.

As Christmas looms ever closer, your guard may be down and you could be easily duped in believing all kinds of stories or excuses, the scammers are well versed in hard luck, sob stories and get rich quick schemes so don't be fooled, you may truly regret giving, forgiving or being charitable.

Pact launches in Cornwall to unite parents in delaying childhood Smartphone ownership.

A quarter of 3 and 4 year olds now own their own Smartphone according to data from Ofcom and by the age of 12 it rises to 95% of children. Designed to be addictive Smartphones encourage children to use them regularly and parents can then find their child has excessive screen habits leading to poor sleep patterns, less time to play with friends, exposure to harmful content and poor mental health.

In February 2024 a couple of parents decided to make a pledge to delay getting their child a Smartphone believing that childhood is too short to be spent on a Smartphone. Initially they set up a Whatsapp group to bring like minded parents together, it quickly spread and now there is a Smartphone Free Childhood Whatsapp community in every area of the UK, including an active community in Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly.

Peer pressure is strong on the issue and parents feel compelled to buy one for their child so they aren't left out. With this in mind Smartphone Free Childhood launched a pact in September 2024 which allows families to pledge to delay getting their child a Smartphone until 14; the age recommended by Mental Health Professionals. Parents can then see the results of the pact which are anonymous but detail the results by the school name and year group which reassures a child that they will not be the only one without a Smartphone. The movement is gaining momentum and Virgin Media/O2 have reported their sales of non-Smartphones or basic/ retro style mobile phones have doubled in the last year as parents are choosing these for their children instead.

Jo, a parent from mid Cornwall described how the pact had helped her "No one in my child's school had signed the pact so my school didn't appear on the results, I signed as the first person for my child's school and then told other parents at school about it. Now lots of other families have signed too so it's been helpful for my child."

Since the pact launch, parents of over 870 children in half of the schools across the region from the Five Islands Academy on the Isles of Scilly to Sir Robert Geffrey's school near Saltash have signed the pact to delay.

A football club representative said if they are to apply for grants, they need a long-term lease. An ideal term would be 15 years. It was agreed to form a working group (Cllrs Richardson, Slade and Bolt) to look at the existing lease to see if any changes need to be made. This will be placed on the January agenda

3 War memorial

Cllr Slade said she had spoken with Sarah Wickett, who has said she would be happy to be responsible for the war memorial and will see if there is any money available for its upkeep.

4 Bude and Stratton Town Council skatepark

The parish council received correspondence from Bude & Stratton Town Council regarding its skatepark, with a request for funding. The clerk will reply to say thank you for the letter, but there are no funds available currently.

5 Defibrillator

The new defibrillator has been delivered and is waiting for installation. Thanks were extended to Cllr Chopak for bringing the offer to the council's attention.

6 Location of parish council meetings

After a suggestion at the October meeting that the parish council meets at the parish hall, clarification was sought from CALC, who said meetings could be held there provided the bar was closed. Cllr Johns said the hall costs $\pounds700$ a month to run, so it would not be able to offer a venue for free. It was proposed that meetings remain at the Chapel. This can be reviewed at a later stage.

7 South West Water

The clerk has spoken to South West Water with a view of a

A culvert at the bottom of Stew arts Road dropped and was reported and dealt with. Cllr Hamlyn has also reported a number of pot holes.


A meeting was held recently with Cllrs Slade, Richardson and Hamlyn, along with Cllr Chopak, Oliver Jones and resident Tamsin Fay. Cllr Richardson reported that the 20mph speed limit will start with a consultation process next year (parish council then public), which might address some concerns. Several flashing speed indicator signs are coming to the end of their four-year life. These are then available for anyone to pitch for. He said Cllr Chopak has put in for three. If successful, Cornwall Council will deal with the installation and their management would fall with the parish council. Data can be collected and downloaded. They are looking to start some speed monitoring on the Launceston road. The baby Jesus, Elijah. Week St. Mary Parish Council held on Tuesday, December 3rd 2024

1 **Public question time** (15 minutes allowed for this – on matters on the agenda only)

Discussions included the football goals on the upper playing field and the football club lease. One member of the public picked out a few points from previous minutes. Another resident spoke about the lease and said it was important to have one as it is impossible to get grants with a short time of tenure on a lease. He said the field was purchased, not to facilitate the football club, but to allow space for a community centre should it ever be built.

To receive County Councillor Nicky Chopak's report on matters arising

Cllr Chopak said she had received an email from Oliver Jones of Highways to say a radar deployment has been requested on the approach from North Park. This will take place post 2025. He asked for the proposal of three locations. With regards to the parking situation at Parsonage Green, Oliver urged people to report it to parking enforcement on a regular basis. Any alterations at this location will be added to a future Traffic Regulation Order. Cllr Chopak said there were still a few issues around waste and recycling but hopefully these will settle by Christmas. Since she last attended the parish council meeting, there have been two full meetings of Cornwall Council. At one there was a vote of no confidence in the leader, which failed. She reminded councillors that there will be an election in May. She hoped all councillors will continue beyond May, as if the parish council needs to have an election it would cost in the region of £2,000 to £3,000. The next Community Area Partnership meeting will be held on Monday virtually, with the focus being on transport. She said there has been some concern about local buses, with the bus from Jacobstow that goes to Launceston no longer stopping right outside Tesco, but in-
