



Week St Mary Community Speed Watch

National Road Safey Week 17th - 23rd November 2024

Community Speed Watch is a national volunteer initiative designed to educate drivers who are monitored speeding in local communities. It is carried out by proactive volunteers from local communities where there is a concern for speeding in their area.

Each year an average of 28,000 people are killed or seriously injured on the roads in the UK. Driving even a small amount above the speed limit, or driving too fast in poor weather conditions increases the risk of crashing and the likelihood of those involved sustaining serious or fatal injuries.

In Devon & Cornwall, local community groups - including CSW teams - are working alongside other organisations to form the 'Vision Zero South West' road safety partnership. The partnership has set an ambitious target of reducing all fatal and serious collisions on Devon & Cornwall's roads by 50% by 2030. So that communities and families like ours do not suffer the tragedy and heartbreak that come with road traffic collisions.

Week St Mary Bonaventures Women's Institute - October Meeting

The real truth about Poldark. That was the subject of our latest talk from local man Terry Faull entitled "Demelza's People – The Married Widows of Cornwall". Fascinating but the truth is never pleasant. We are encouraged to think of Cornwall as expansive coastline views, mysterious ruins of mines, empty moors (apart from the ponies) and romantic cottages. However, in the 18th century there were more rich people in Cornwall and Devon than the rest of the country , the reason being that by the 19th century, Cornwall was one of the most industrialised areas in the country and there were over 2,000 tin mines in the county.

It was known that there was copper and tin underground both of which were badly needed all over the world. Investors/Adventurers would identify potential sites, negotiate a lease from the land owners and open up a mine. The landlords negotiated 8% of all the profits made without any involvement or responsibilities. So much money was made by both the land owners and the Investors that new banks were created to look after all the monies. However, this all came at a price – namely the workers.

Because of the atrocious conditions, miners were not expected to live beyond 30 years. All the family worked in or on top of the mines including the wife and children. They had to buy their own shovels, candles and gunpowder (this came out of their wages) and were paid in either Cornish or Devon Pennies; which, of course, could only be used in the local shops owned by the mine. Everyone worked 10 hours a day 6 days a week (Sundays were for church or chapel) apart from Good Friday and Christmas Day. In order to supplement their meagre wages some miners managed to lease a small plot of land and became small farmers. These were rented on a 3 lives lease: 3 members of the family were named in the lease and it had to be transferred to them. If they died – as was often the case – then the lease reverted back to the mine owner. This was also common in Devon and Ireland.

Unfortunately, in the latter half of the 19th century, tin and copper

began to be mined abroad in Chile, Bolivia and Australia and these imports were cheaper. The result was that the local mine owners took risks and the mines became deeper with some tunneling under the sea in order to maximise profits. Miners could walk 5 miles from home to the mine, take 1½ hours to climb down the ladder to the bottom and perhaps another ¼ mile to the end of the seam. When they finished their shift they reversed the process.

Living conditions were also frightful with tiny cottages having earth walls and floors. With lodgers (for extra income) it was known for up to 20 people to share with miners hot-bedding if they worked shifts. If a mine closed, men would have to travel to another mine, often miles away from their home. Mine owners built barracks for some of the men who would travel home perhaps once a month.

Eventually, the cheap imports meant that the local mining industry collapsed within a month and the miners emigrated all across the globe. Hence the saying "At the bottom of every mine, you'll find a Cornish-man". This is also where the description of "the Married Widows" came from. Husbands were abroad for some years and the women were expected to continue to support themselves and their children even though, as wives, they had no rights. Sometimes the husbands were able to send money but it was difficult and accidents continued to happen with miners being killed which left the families destitute. They were often supported by the community or Chapel. Many wives became very strong and resilient but most had to rely on the local Parish Guardians and later on, the Parish Workhouses. These were amalgamated into fewer larger workhouses which, in turn, became hospitals when the NHS was established after the Second World War. When we next look at the various mine ruins perhaps we should spare a thought for the families who worked and died there.

A post script: William Blake wrote the hymn "Jerusalem" after visiting the West Cornwall mining area. Very appropriate for the WI members listening who had just sung their anthem!

PSR confirms decision on APP scams reimbursement

Here is some recent news, which I am sure will be most welcomed by all internet users in the UK. However, it is only available from the 7th October, previous scams will only be recovered at the discretion of the Bank involved. Maximum amounts apply, irrespective of losses!

The PSR has recently confirmed the maximum reimbursement limit for victims of Authorised Push Payment (APP) scams starting from 7 October. Having given careful consideration to all the feedback and information received, the PSR board has decided that the maximum reimbursement limit for Faster Payments will be £85,000.

The PSR's requirements will provide world-leading protections to people who fall victim to scams – with over 99% of APP claims covered by the reimbursement cap. It will also give firms strong financial incentives to continue to make improvements to their fraud prevention controls.

This was a carefully balanced decision – which provides significant protection to fraud victims and strikes an appropriate balance having regard to the PSR's innovation and competition objectives and making sure that payment systems work well for everyone. A final policy statement to explain the reasoning for the decision will be published next week.

The regulator is making this short announcement to ensure everyone is clear on its decision and to provide clarity on the limit prior to the reimbursement requirements coming into effect on 7 October, supporting their implementation, so that people benefit from the protections from that date.

The Bank of England, as the operator of CHAPS, has carefully considered the feedback made in relation to CHAPS as part of the same consultation. The Bank has decided that the maximum reimbursement for CHAPS will be £85,000. In making this decision, the Bank has given weight to the benefits to industry and consumers of having consistency of limits across the two payment systems. The Bank is committed to reviewing this limit within 12 months.

Week St. Mary Parish Council held on Thursday, October 3rd 2024

1 **Public question time** (15 minutes allowed for this – on matters on the agenda only)

A number of residents spoke about the lack of water in the village. Cllr Chopak said she had contacted South West Water's area manager, and Ben Maguire, North Cornwall MP has got a meeting with them.

A resident spoke about speeding. Cllr Chopak said speed humps were being removed. due to climate change. Islands have been installed in other villages, but in South Petherwin there have been three accidents since an island was put there. The parish council has requested speed monitoring, and Cllr Chopak said towns and villages will be asked if they want 20mph in their villages.

One resident said the football club was given less than a month's notice that funding will be withdrawn. Cllr Slade said the decision was made to purchase a mower. The council is aware of how old the football club mower is. The council is doing what it can to save money. Prior to this, the top area of the playing field and Lambley Corner were costing a total of $\pounds1,500$ a year. Cllr Slade said the council appreciates all the football club does for the village. The council is proud of its facilities and supports the football club as it does other village organisations.

One member of the public asked about removing the posts on the lower area for more parking. It was agreed this would continue to be closed for the winter following the bank slippage.

To receive County Councillor Nicky Chopak's report on matters arising

Cornwall Council want to sell Newquay Airport. There is also a proposal to do the same with some car parks, particularly town car parks. There has been a recent vote of

	no confidence in the council leader. This failed by two votes. There is a £160 million overspend, which has to be found by April. There will be some significant cuts, including school transport. Treetops, the developers have withdrawn the application.

Ruminations from the Rectory

A Camel Story

Once upon a time there was a rich man who lived in the deserts of the middle east. You could tell how rich he was because of what he owned and especially how many camels belonged to him. In fact, he was so rich that he owned not 2, 4, 6, 8, but 17 camels.

He had led a peaceful and prosperous life and so when he was very old and near to death he wrote his will, explaining how he intended to leave his wealth to his only son, his grandson and to his one nephew. The terms of the will were these. One half of his riches should go to his own son, one third should go to his grandchild and one ninth of his wealth should go to his nephew. This seemed fair. Soon after this the rich man died. Now when it came time to dividing up the camels according to the will, the three beneficiaries ran into a problem.

If half the camels were given to the son then he should get how many? 8.5 which would mean killing a camel. If a third of the camels were given to the grandson, that would mean again killing a camel so he could get five and two thirds. And when it came to the nephew, there was no way he could get his share unless another camel was killed.

The three of them became frustrated and soon got very angry with each other. They shouted and quarrelled and argued and even threatened to go to war over the camels. Secretly they began stockpiling their weapons and plotting their battle campaigns. Nearby there lived a very poor man. You could tell he was very poor because he only had one camel. Although he was so poor, and seemed to have no influence, he still felt he should do something to help. He wanted to stop war breaking out. He wanted to be a peacemaker. But what could he do? He decided to offer his one and only camel into the rich man's inheritance to help sort out the problem. It was a huge sacrifice. The inheritance now consisted of 18 camels. The three sat down and did the sums. Half of the 18 would go to the son so he took 9. One third of the 18 would go to the grandson so he took 6. One ninth of 18 would go to the nephew, so he took 2. And to every bodies great surprise there was one camel left over. So, the poor man received his camel back. He had made peace by his willingness to give up all he had and it had made all the difference and he had not lost out in the end. Jesus said, Blessed are the peace makers, for they will be called

sons of God. Matthew chapter 5 verse 9.

Email issues cause problems for many!

There has recently been a spate of issues for email users, some have found issues with passwords whilst others have had access restricted to outlook and Hotmail as the new outlook software, recently released and installed, has develop conflicts with existing outlook mail software, or Thunderbird has crashed restricting further access.

First is the issue with passwords, some providers have adopted the policy of forcing users to change passwords, either the password has insufficient characters, is overly simplistic, or the same password has been in use for several years without change.

Then there is the regular occurrence of simply forgetting what the password is, I am not pointing a finger at any one person, or section of society, but the need to have several different passwords for each online account can be truly confusing.

I myself break many of the rules in password management, but I am not going to tell you what they are!

The second is the new outlook mail program, designed to be more secure and by default causes some users with older machines to experience lost emails and attachments, creating anxious moments, sometimes with devastating outcomes.

All too many users keep important emails and documents stored on their email server, I have recently had one user with over 30, 000 emails stored dating back 8 years and many of you may well admit to having done the same.

This is a seriously dangerous practice as the email server, especially the free ones, can crash, be hacked into or the provider withdraw a free service, and it is happening more regular than ever before. If you change telephone provider, your old email account can be lost forever. As already experienced by many users.

For all important emails and attachments copy them out into a file in your documents folder or similar and don't leave them on the server thinking they are safe there, they are not!



Although recommended by some providers, access to your email account via a Browser can be equally insecure as History caches hold data which can be hacked into by roque cookies. To help stop

this I suggest installing one or more extensions such as, <u>Ghostery</u>, Badger and Ad Blocker Ultimate and block roque files from getting on your computer. Don't laugh at silly names, they are free and will provide you with better protection than most of the free anti-virus software packages.

Download and install adwcleaner from toolslib.com and see how many infected files are on your computer, hopefully none, but you may just be surprised at the result!
